A Native American Land Reparation **Pledge**

Deparations to Indigenous Through our work with Massachusetts' Peace Abbey, we have developed one action that might work well for others, the Native Land Reparation Pledge (NLRP). The pledge states one's intention to donate 1% of the sale price of our homes (when we sell) to the Indigenous tribe whose ancestral homeland we now own and from which we financially benefit.

The origins of the Native Land Reparation Pledge arose from the Quaker-inspired Native Land Preservation Action. In 2020, the Trump administration took the Mashpee Wampanoag Tribe's 321 acres of land out of trust. A reservation is key to self-governance, housing, health care, education, judicial services, and language reclamation. As a result, Friends gathered signatures to reinstate the tribe's land trust and sent them to the Department of the Interior. The action says, if our land is protected, then certainly the Mashpee Wampanoags' land should be. How could we accept otherwise?

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

BRINGING EARTHCARE CONCERNS TO THE RELIGIOUS SOCIETY OF FRIENDS



We hosted presentations on eco-spirituality, environmental justice, activism, and population during the virtual Friends General Conference annual gathering.



We launched monthly online workshops, like "International Climate Policy: From Quiet Diplomacy to Youth Activism" with Kallan Benson (Fridays for Future USA Director and Friend from Annapolis, MD) and Lindsey Cook (QUNO Representative for Climate Change.



Through our QEW Presents! program, we connected speakers to

monthly and yearly meetings to offer talks on a wide variety of Earthcare concerns.

Our staff and volunteers also presented workshops and talks at yearly and monthly meetings across North America.

The QEW Population Working Group also held monthly meetings, often featuring speakers, and prepared articles for publication.

ECOLOGICAL GRIEF RESOURCES

Over 220 people registered for Hayley


Hathaway and Gayle Matson's Ecological Grief

ECO-SPIRITUALITY

Staff offered a workshop for Southeastern Yearly Meeting's Young Adult Friends on ecospirituality.

118 people joined a 3-part discussion series on the book, The Depth of Our Belonging: Mysticism, Physics and Healing by Mary Conrow Coelho.

The Elizabeth Ann Bogert Memorial Fund for the Study and Practice of Christian Mysticism awarded Hayley Hathaway a grant to create a workshop on the connections between eco-spirtuality and eco-justice.


WORKING IN PARTNERSHIP











We joined the global campaign to divest from asset manager Vanguard in collaboration with Earth Quaker Action Team and UK Friends.

QEWs Friends Committee on National Legislation Working Group drafted and submitted our priorities for FCNL's work with the 118th Congress.

QEW participates in a monthly meeting of international Quaker organizations working on climate.

QEW staff spoke at the Friends World Committee for Consultation's midwest climate consultation with 40 Friends from 14 Yearly Meetings on "Spirit-led Action on Climate Change."

We continue our work to consider racial and environmental justice in all of our actions, including in our partnerships with other organizations and coalitions.



LOCAL EARTHCARE PROJECTS

Each year, QEW offers mini-grants to Quaker meetings, churches, and other Quaker groups to support hands-on projects that foster Earthcare. In this fiscal year, we supported:

Monteverde Friends Meeting and School (Costa Rica) Solar Array Inverter Replacement: Funds to replace failed inverter for solar array for Friends School

Albuquerque Friends Meeting (Fellbaum Health Center Landscaping, Kaimosi, Kenya): Landscaping to divert rainwater at Fellbaum Community Health Center, Kaimosa, Kenya


Kwibuka Yearly Meeting (Friends Church of Burundi) Tree Nursery for Reforestation: Establish tree nursery to support reforestation efforts

Newtown Square Friends Meeting (Pennsylvania): Wildflower Garden




STERING COMMITTEE

QEW is guided by a 50-person steering committee that uses Quaker process and decision-making, which includes about 20 at-large members and 30 nominated representatives from Quaker yearly meetings in North America.



We held two virtual steering committee meetings on April 7-10 and October 20-23.

We welcomed Brad Stocker and Beverly Ward as coclerks of QEW. They will serve for this fiscal year and the following fiscal year.



STAFF

QEW's day-to-day work is done by staff. We expanded our team in mid-2021 to enhance our outreach and programming. Our staff consists of General Secretary, Shelley Tanenbaum, Co-Director, Hayley Hathaway, and Technical Administrator, Emily Carroll. We also have part-time bookkeeper, Holly Wilder.


FINANCE & DEVELOPMENT

This fiscal year (November 1, 2021 to October 31, 2022), most of our expenditures went to:

- staff time
- publication costs (printing, postage, editing),
- outreach (visits to monthly and yearly meetings, and events)
- and maintaining our network (Steering Committee meetings, conference calls, database maintenance).

We spend about 10% of our budget on fundraising (15% of staff salaries plus the cost of the annual appeal).


Due to the pandemic, most of our travel was converted to video conferences, including our two Steering Committee meetings, significantly lowering these expenses.





QEW staff have worked to improve our fundraising over the past five years to help us to reach more Friends with our resources, offer impactful programming, and pay staff fairer wages and offer better benefits. This year we used some of our reserves for additional expenses.

FINANCE & DEVELOPMENT

Nearly all of our income comes from monthly/yearly meeting donations and from individuals. This year, we're grateful for 53 new individual donors & 512 total donors.







WHAT'S NEXT?

We envision a new way of relating to our environment and to each other based in mutuality, care, and reverence. This vision is being shared more and more in the Society of Friends and the world.

In 2023, we plan to work to:

- » Serve as a hub for Friends working on environmental concerns through our website, events, and resources,

- » Produce a quarterly publication, BeFriending Creation, and highlight stories of Friends' engagement and environmental justice,
- » Continue our work on Climate Grief, supporting Friends as they seek way forward
- » Speak out publicly to support Friends actions on Earthcare,
- » Offer mini-grants for hands-on local Earthcare projects.
