Quaker Earthcare Witness is a network of North American Friends (Quakers) and other likeminded people who are taking spirit-led action to address the ecological and social crises of the world, emphasizing Quaker process and testimonies.

A Quaker Vision for the Decade Ahead

Quaker Earthcare Witness (QEW) is a North American Quaker nonprofit that works to embody a growing ministry of Earthcare within the Religious Society of Friends. Our network is dedicated to bringing about a spiritual shift in Quakerism and beyond that can tip the scales towards a life-giving future for our species and all others as we stand at the crossroads of facilitating a mass extinction or regeneration of Life in the 21st century.

launched 2024. **QEW** In the QuakerEarth Campaign - a 10-year plan to address the pressing need in this decade for Quakers to rise to the challenge and develop a Quaker Environmental Movement worthy of our times. We launched QEW on the Road - galvanizing and uniting Friends from South Africa to Europe, the US to Canada. We supported efforts in the Never Vanguard Campaign - taking part in a 200+ person march on the largest funder of fossil fuels in the world and the broader Summer of Heat protests pushing banks towards fossil fuel divestment. We hosted side events for UN Climate Negotiations in Baku, Azerbaijan, the High Level Political Forum, and other events on the international stage - bringing a Quaker Voice. We got our hands dirty, supporting rainwater harvesting to ecological restoration and community health from Kenya to New England.





ANNUAL REPORT 2023-2024

This year, the Earth spoke in no uncertain terms-through record heat, melting ice, and floods that washed away the illusion of control. And yet, amid the tumult, something older and quieter is rising: a wisdom as old as the hills. In the pulse of coral reefs, the unfurling of leaves, and the turning of seasons, Life is offering us instruction-if we will humble ourselves enough to listen. Around the world, unprecedented action is finally stirring. Humanity is beginning to remember what Earth has always known: that to survive, we must move in rhythm with Life, not against it. QEW is committed to helping Friends align with this deeper wisdom—and rise in sacred partnership with a living plan-

We live in a dire moment - but the Light shines brightest in the dark. As we enter 2025, we ask that Friends not seek so much to "have hope" but to become hope. QEW aims to lead this charge as it lays the groundwork for the first-ever global map of Quaker Environmental Action, seeks to protect US Climate Legislation, and empowers monthly meetings and Quaker organizations to become centers of resilience, spirituality, and action.

With new vision and new voices, QEW is hoping to become a bolder ally to activist and advocacy efforts with our strategic partners, deepen into our spiritual foundations, and evolve into an organization that is as bold as our times are urgent – a prophetic organization for prophetic times.

HOW WE WORK

QEW works through five domains: supporting Quaker and interfaith campaigns for eco-justice, bolstering the advocacy efforts of partner organizations at the UN and in Washington, sharing our ministry on eco-spiritual matters through talks and workshops across North America, directing funds around the world through our mini-grants program, and publishing pamphlets, curriculum, and our quarterly newsletter, Befriending Creation, to empower, inspire, and inform the Quaker Environmental Movement.







QEW offered a keynote address with Daniel Schmachtenberger, discussing the crisis we face, the importance of uniting spirit and strategy, and this moment as a rite of passage for us all. The recording of this keynote has nearly 30,000 hits on YouTube, the largest viewership for any QEW media to date.



QEW gathered in the deserts of Albuquerque, New Mexico last fall with indigenous activist, singer, and speaker Dr. Lyla June Johnston as we together envisioned a new story for humanity and the Earth.

Activism & Advocacy

» Vanguard S.O.S

On July 3rd, QEW joined Earth Quaker Action Team in an action of over 200 Friends at the headquarters of Vanguard to demand that the company, which is the world's largest investor in coal, oil, and gas, take meaningful action on climate change.

» Summer of Heat on Wall Street

Amidst record-breaking heat, The Summer of Heat and called on CitiBank to phase out fossil fuel financing and scale up renewable energy investments. QEW joined Faith Week (July 28th to August 3rd) which saw couragous acts of witness, including the arrest of twenty-three clergy and faith activists at CitiBank headquarters.


» The Quaker Call to Action

QEW worked to help our network seek out relationships, understanding, and credible news sources during the 2024 election year through BeFriending Creation, email annoucements, and a workshop at our Spring Gathering.



Publications

This year, saw the creation of three issues of Befriending Creation, an audio-described version by Brad Stocker of our Introduction to Quaker Earthcare Witness one-pager (making them more accessible), and a set of pamphlets designed to help our community spread QEW's message within their yearly meetings.



BY THE NUMBERS







Mini-Grants

QEW's mini-grants encourage Quaker witness through practice: recipients match funds when possible and share photos & reports, seeding ideas across our network. Applications are reviewed twice yearly by the Mini-Grant Working Group; who awards small, hands-on grants—up to US \$1500—to Quaker meetings, churches, schools, and partner groups whose projects couple ecological benefit with community empowerment. This year, 10 grants totaling US \$9,250 catalysed climate-positive action from Michigan to Kenya.


United Nations Climate Negotiations

QEW co-hosted three United Nations Side Events: one in-person event at SB60 in Germany, an event online with the Forum on Sustainable Development, and a final in-person event at COP29 in Azerbaijan. We collaborated with Quaker United Nations Office and other allies to put on programs focused on the intersections of Earthcare, Justice, and Peacemaking.

While climate negotiations face significant headwinds in our current political climate, progress is being made as nations agree to new treaties on loss & damage and climate justice. Our interfaith allies remain a beacon of hope and conscience in the tumult of our world.

Financials

OEW continued strengthen our witness for Earthcare through an active year of outreach. publications, and grants. Our largest investment remained in staffing, which provided the backbone for a full calendar of programs - most notably the launch of QEW on the Road. with visits to Friends meetings, gatherings, and conferences across North America beyond. and We brought Quaker Earthcare presence to FWCC's World Plenary, Friends the General Conference Gathering's



Earthcare Center, and three separate United Nations climate events. Befriending Creation, our quarterly newsletter, continued to share Friends' stories of faithful Earthcare, while our Mini-Grant program supported grassroots environmental projects among Friends and their communities.

This work was made possible through the generous support of Friends, foundations, and registration fees. Contributions and grants totaled \$184,936, modestly below budget, while expenses came to \$195,407, also under budget,

resulting in a expected deficit of \$12,031 to enable program expansion. Outreach and program activities - particularly visitations, publications, and special projects - accounted for a substantial share of spending, reflecting our commitment to direct ministry and capacity building. We closed the year with healthy reserves of \$90,599 in cash and investments, including \$3,466 in temporarily restricted funds for designated purposes, positioning QEW to carry this momentum forward into the coming year.
